The Dementia Care Triad

Christine Jensen

Dr. Jensen will define the relationship between families coping with Alzheimer's disease, the diagnosed individual and healthcare professionals. In addition, she will identify ways to create more effective partnership. Finally, she will discuss strategies to identify and incorporate other key members into the care partnership.

This session will identify driving assessment tools and explore the legal and ethical boundaries in the discontinuation of driving after a diagnosis of dementia.

Understanding the Issues of Younger Onset Dementia
